<p><b>Agnostic</b> - the view that the existence of God, the divine, or the supernatural is not known or knowable with any certainty.</p> <p><b>Theist</b> - a person who believes in the existence of a god or gods.</p> <p><b>Atheist</b> - a person who disbelieves or lacks belief in the existence of God or gods.</p> <p><b>Omnipotent</b> - having unlimited power.</p>	<p><b>Synagogue</b>- Jewish place of worship meaning a place of assembly.</p> <p><b>Anglican</b> – relating to the Church of England.</p> <p><b>Baptist</b> - a member of a Protestant Christian denomination advocating baptism only of adult believers by total immersion.</p> <p><b>Orthodox</b> – the religion of those Jews who adhere most strictly to traditional beliefs and practices.</p> <p><b>Reform</b> - a religious movement that has modified many traditional Jewish beliefs or practices.</p> <p><b>Brahman</b> - <b>the Ultimate Reality, the supreme God</b> in Hinduism.</p>	<p><b>Forgiveness</b> – deliberate decision to release feelings of resentment</p> <p><b>Generosity</b> – a willingness to give help or support</p> <p><b>Mission statement</b> – a formal summary of the aims and values of a company, organization, or individual.</p> <p><b>Apape love</b> - unconditional love.</p>	<p><b>Shahadah:</b> The declaration of faith and belief in Muhammad. Muslims repeat this several times a day.</p> <p><b>Salah:</b> The 5 prayers completed daily.</p> <p><b>Zakat:</b> Giving to those in need.</p> <p><b>Sawm:</b> To fast during Ramadan.</p> <p><b>Hajj:</b> Making a religious pilgrimage to Mekkah at least once during a person's lifetime if able.</p>

			<p><b>Ramadan</b> - the ninth month of the Muslim year</p> <p><b>Ummah</b> – Muslim community</p> <p>A <b>burkha</b> covers a woman's face and body entirely. It is made from one piece of cloth.</p> <p>A <b>hijab</b> is the name of the headscarf worn by Muslim women.</p> <p><b>Modesty</b> - not show off their bodies by wearing revealing clothes.</p>
